## Holy Trinity C of E Primary School – SPORTS PREMIUM STATEMENT –ACTUAL SPENDING ACADEMIC YEAR 2017-2018 (01/09/2017 to 31/08/2018)

From April 2013 primary schools have been allocated funding from the Department of Education to develop their Physical Education and School Sports provision. This money is ring-fenced and to be used for improving the quality and breadth of sport and PE within schools.

For 2017/18 we had an allocation of £18,830 in addition to a carry forward 2016-2017 of £8,856. The total available funding is therefore £27,686. Holy Trinity CE Primary spent £22,666 during the academic year 2017-2018. The carry forward as at 31/08/2018 is £5,019. The report below details how we have spent this money and the impact it had on our pupils
